In her spare time, Zalwango enjoys netball. She is a farmer, and she hopes to one day raise farm animals, particularly pigs. The training provided by KAASO will help her to improve her farming skills, while also providing education in business and literacy.

St. Paul's Kabira Adult Attention and School of Orphans (KAASO) is a private school which provides students in Rakai with primary school education and adult literacy and business training. The school's various educational programs help students develop the skills they need to secure employment and improve their families' livelihoods. The skills taught at KAASO will allow the students to become leaders in their communities and participate in raising awareness of HIV/AIDs, gender equality, and environmental stewardship.

KAASO was established in 1999 by the Community of Kabira Local Council. In late 2009, the Canadian International Learning Foundation, started a partnership between Ugandan educator Mukwaya Dominic Kalinizi and the Uganda Literacy and Education Program in Canada, managed by Mallory Mroz. As of October 2009, approximately 50 male and female students were enrolled KAASO's *Zibula Attude* program. This initiative (translated to 'you cannot earn while sitting') aims to empower the community by providing employment-oriented education and literacy training. This project is in the final stages of planning and in the early stages of its implementation.

Beyond Zibula Attude, KAASO operates a community centre, a maize mill project, a piggery project and a micro loans program. These various initiatives aim to empower and equip the community to enable them to bring their children into a brighter future. Moreover, these projects provide KAASO with a sustainable income. Profits from these various projects allow KAASO to feed the students, pay the salaries for the teachers, and administrative and support staff.

In addition to its community outreach and empowerment programs, KAASO currently provides primary school education to over 600 students, aged thee to sixteen. These students learn

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Luganda, English, mathematics, religious topics, physical education, and, depending on the students' age, social sciences, science and geography.

Students typically pay what they can for each semester. The money usually comes from family members or sponsors. For "total orphans" (students who have no parents), the students pay their school fees in assisting the younger children or teachers with chores and household duties such as fetching water, gathering firewood, bathing and washing the clothes of the young students, among other things.

The school itself employs more than 15 teachers, administrators and support staff, including 4 female teachers and 3 female teachers. KAASO also accepts international volunteers (a maximum of three at any one time) to assist the students with remedial classes, provide extra support to students who are falling behind and assist the teachers with their many duties.

International volunteers pay KAASO a small fee (\$350USD for the first month, \$150USD for the second month, \$100USD for the first month, and \$80USD for subsequent months). These fees go to the volunteers' accommodation expenses and provide KAASO with an additional source of revenue for various large-scale projects such as a dormitory, a community library and an electric pump to bring non-potable water to the school.

The Canadian International Learning Foundation (CanILF) is an Ottawa-based, volunteer-run registered charity which provides and promotes employment-oriented education in areas of the world affected by poverty, war and disease epidemics (at-risk areas).

Mission: CanILF seeks to reach its goals through the following activities:

- Funding for Scholarships and Infrastructure: Awarding scholarships to students who
 demonstrate academic potential, community service and leadership, and to provide educational
 equipment (such as computers or textbooks) to the schools they attend;
- Online Courses: Providing education to students via the Internet, including courses in entrepreneurship, business management or Information Technology (IT); and
- Mentoring: Offering instruction, advice and practical assistance on planning, management and proposal writing to the leaders of educational institutions.

Current Projects: Since 2007, CanILF has provided financial support and mentorship to a post-secondary school, the Afghan-Canadian Community Center (or ACCC) in Kandahar, Afghanistan. The ACCC provides courses in Business Management, IT, English and Health Care to approximately 1,000 women and men. Students at the ACCC also receive recognized Canadian online education via the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology and the Canada e-School.

The ACCC's programs provide the skills its students need to obtain employment at a cost-per-student from \$10 to \$25 per month. Once employed, students support themselves and their families (on average, 6 members of their immediate and extended family), give back to their communities and participate in the reconstruction of Afghanistan. With CanILF's help, close to 500 students have obtained employment or promotions as a result of the ACCC's programs. CanILF also enables the ACCC to receive grants from the Canadian International Development Agency and further grants, scholarships and private funding from other international donors.

Emerging Projects: CanILF has begun a second project to benefit the Community Empowerment Program at St. Paul's Kabira Adult Attention and School of Orphans (KAASO) via its Uganda Literacy and Education Program (ULEP). The Community Empowerment Program provides women and men in the community with education in basic literacy, business, agriculture and traditional artisanry.
